

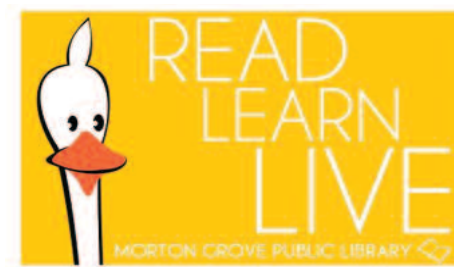

The Library's goal is for every resident of Morton Grove to have his or her own library card. Morton Grove residents who sign up for a **new** Library card or who renew their cards in September will also receive a free, environmentally friendly book tote that can be used to carry all sorts of things in addition to Library materials.

If you don't already have a library card, all you need is one form of identification with your name and current address. There is no charge for a library card. If you have questions about getting a library card, you can go to: www.webrary.org/inside/cards.html or call the Library's Checkout Desk at 847-929-5103.

If you already have a library card and want to get one of the new editions shown above, bring in your old card to trade in on the new model. New cards will be free to the first 500 cardholders if they have no fines and nothing overdue. "Clean up" your account and you can get a new card!

eReader/eBook Help

Need academic help? We have Brainfuse HelpNow for you!

What is BrainFuse HelpNow?

Brainfuse HelpNow is a premium online resource that provides live tutoring in math, science, reading/writing, social studies, PSAT/SAT, ACT, AP, and state standardized tests.

Can anyone use BrainFuse HelpNow?

Anyone can log in to HelpNow at the Library. And, if you have an MGPL library card, you can use it at home as well.

Is BrainFuse HelpNow free?

Yes, all of the Library's subscription electronic resources are free.

Who will benefit from using BrainFuse HelpNow?

BrainFuse HelpNow was designed for students from grades 3–12; early college students and career-minded adults will also find it useful.

What subjects are offered?

Subjects available for students in grades K – Adult Learners are:

- Math, including Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, and Calculus
- Science, including Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Earth Science
- Social Studies, including US History and World History
- English and Language Arts, including Writing Assistance, Reading Comprehension/Grammar/Vocabulary, and Literature in English

When is BrainFuse HelpNow available?

BrainFuse HelpNow is available from 3 pm until 10 pm, seven days a week, excluding holidays.

How do I get started?

Click on the BrainFuse HelpNow link on the Library homepage, www.webrary.org, or at databases.webrary.org. Select the type of help you want by clicking on the applicable button. You will be asked for a subject area and your grade. Although not required, if you want to keep a record of your sessions or use any of the services other than HelpNow, you will need to register and create a free account on your first visit to BrainFuse.

I am working on my résumé; can I submit it for proofreading?

You can submit a résumé, cover letter, or any other type of written paper to the Writing Lab for proofreading. The Writing Lab offers two types of help: immediate help in the beginning stages of the writing process and more detailed suggestions within 24 hours. You will need to log on or create an account to use this service.
